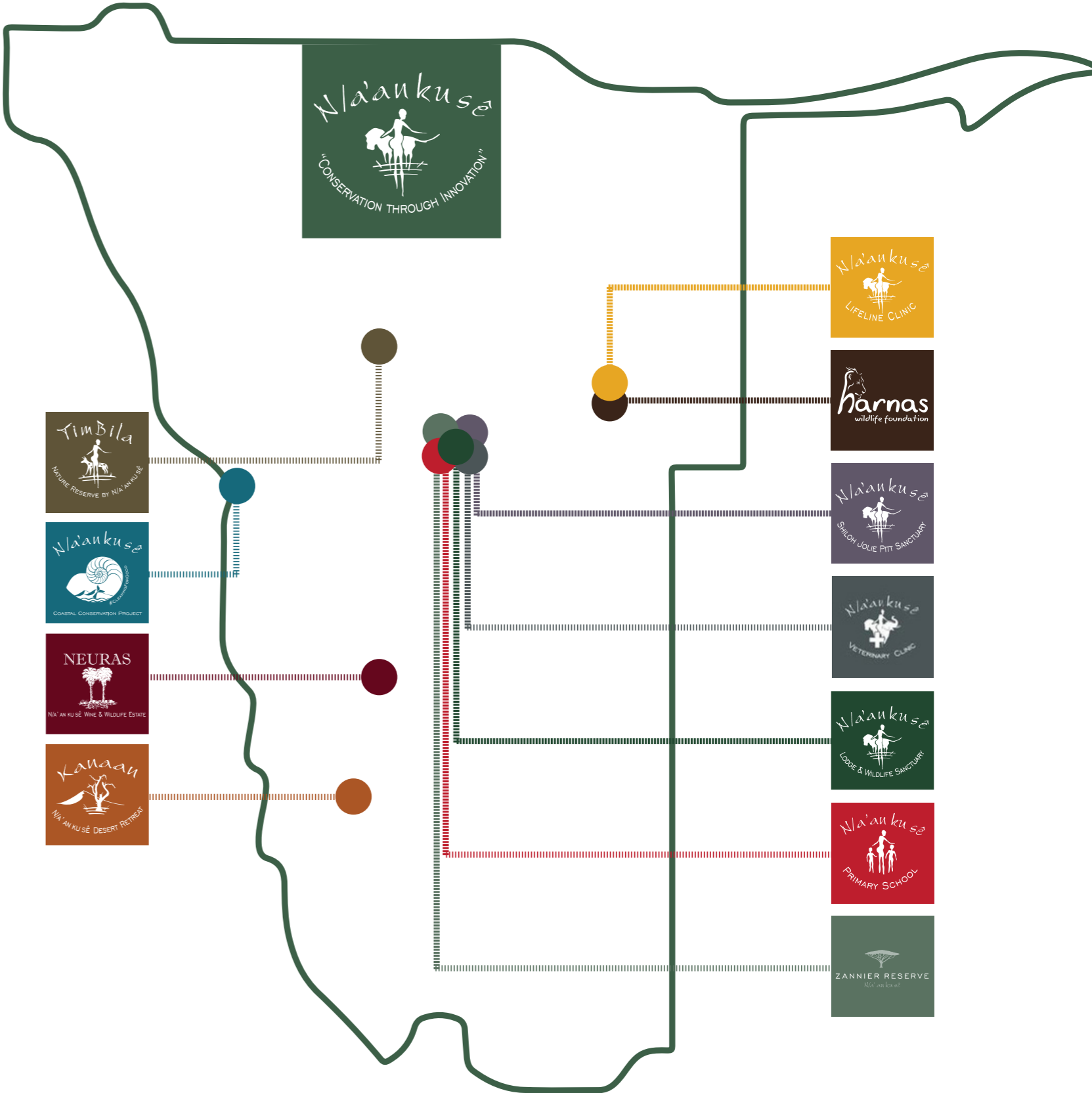

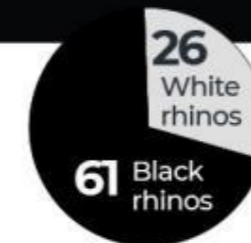

Namibia rhino poaching soars

The number of endangered rhinos poached in Namibia **soared by 93 percent in 2022**, with **87 animals killed**, compared with 45 in 2021, according to government data.

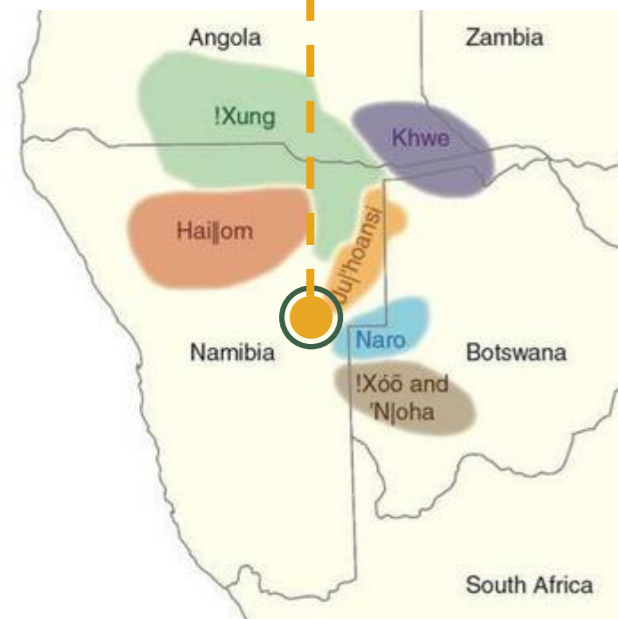

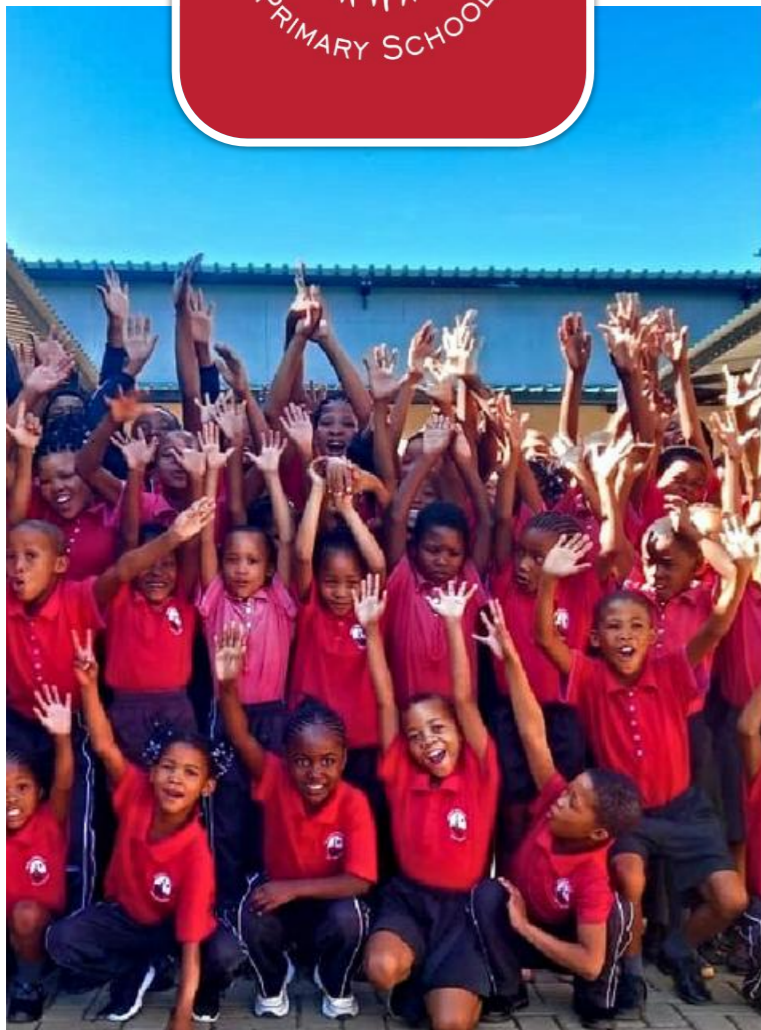

Most of these children come from disadvantaged starts but are thriving under the safe and inclusive education approach adopted at the N/a'an ku sê educational facilities.



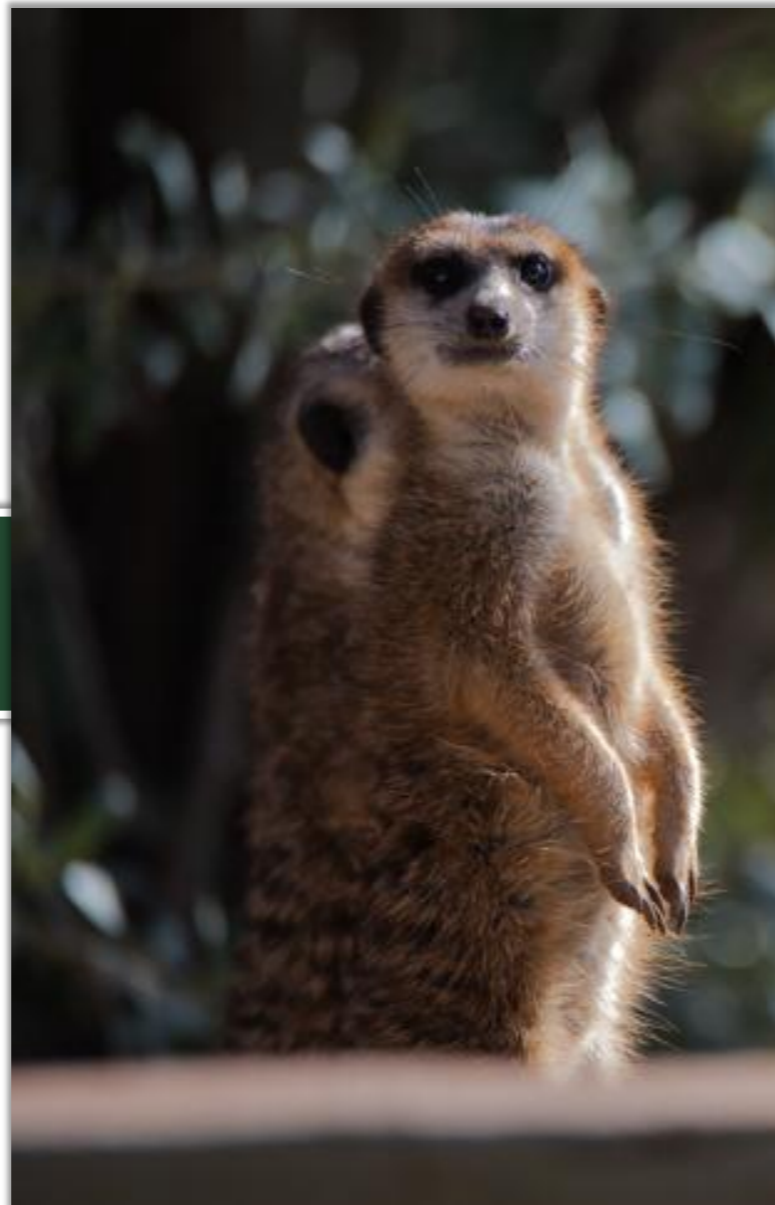

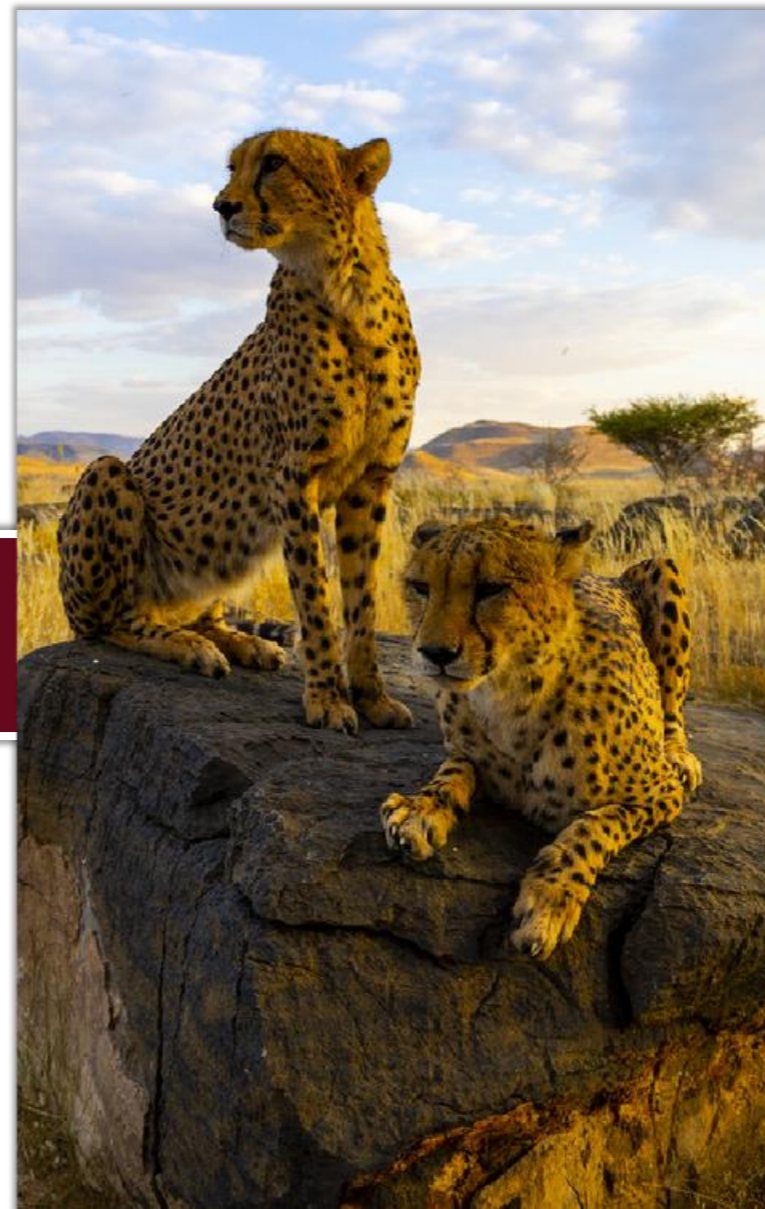
